About Chalkmead



Chalkmead was built about 1980. It was built to be a care home for older people or people living with **dementia**.



Dementia is an illness that affects your memory. It may make you confused.



Chalkmead has room for about 50 people. On 9 September 2021, Chalkmead was home to 27 people.



There are 5 living areas, each with its own lounge and dining room.



There is a courtyard with a garden and seating.



Chalkmead is close to local services, shops and the train station.



In May 2018, The Care Quality Commission checked Chalkmead and said it was a 'good' care home.



About 25 years ago the management of Chalkmead was transferred to Anchor Trust.



The arrangement with Anchor Trust ended in 2019 and the council started to run the care home instead.

About the service



The staff at Chalkmead work hard to provide a caring service for all the people who live in the home.



Over time, fewer people are wanting to go and live in a care home.



The people who do come and live in a care home are likely to need specialist care and support.



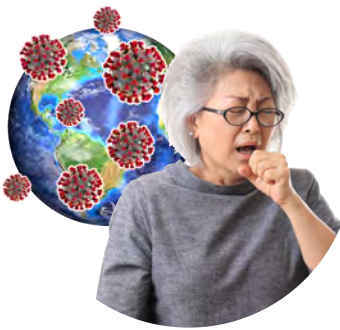
But it is difficult to find space for the specialist equipment that people need.



Some people would prefer to be in a more modern place.



People would prefer to have their own bathroom and toilet.



The shared bathrooms make it difficult to look after people when they have illnesses like sickness, flu and **COVID-19**

COVID-19 is also called Coronavirus. It is an illness that is spreading around the world. It can affect your lungs and breathing.

About the building



We asked a company of independent experts to look at the building.



They said:

- the building is getting old
- it will cost more and more to repair
- it would cost a lot of money to make the building more modern.



About the costs

We think that the council would have to pay:



- £867 a week for every person living at Chalkmead if we carry on as it is now



- £1068 a week for every person if we made parts of the building more modern



- different amounts each time we pay for people to live in a different care home.

3 options

1 2 3

We are looking at 3 options:

1. Carry on as we are now

This would mean:

- no changes to the building or the service
- it would be hard to care for people who need complicated care
- it would be hard to give people the privacy that they want
- people would carry on sharing toilets and bathrooms.



2. Make the buildings more modern



This would mean moving everyone out while we did a lot of improvements to the building.



People would have to move twice if they wanted to move back to Chalkmead.



We would change the bedrooms and give each room its own bathroom.



This means fewer people would be able to live at Chalkmead.

3. Support people to move out, and close Chalkmead



This would mean working with people and their families to find a different care home.



People may be worried during the move.
