It is proposed that the SEN Unit will open at Chandlers Field Primary School on 1 September 2021. The number of pupils on roll will increase incrementally each year, with 7 places available from 1 September 2021. It will reach its full capacity of 25 places by September 2024.

Alteration description

4. A description of the proposed alteration and, in the case of special school proposals, a description of the current special needs provision.

Surrey County Council is proposing that Chandlers Field Primary School hosts a SEN Unit for pupils with a diagnosis of an Autistic Spectrum Condition (ASC), this designation is known locally in Surrey as High COIN (Communication and Interaction Needs). All pupils placed at the SEN unit by Surrey County Council would have an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP) specifying the school as an appropriate placement to meet their individual needs. A bespoke building would be provided for the specialist centre and located within the school grounds.

The unit will have two main classrooms, a number of smaller teaching rooms and a sensory room. This will facilitate a range of learning opportunities from whole class learning, through to group and individual times. The sensory room will be a quiet reflective place for children to use who require sensory regulation.

The proposed alteration would mean that children with high COIN needs in Surrey will have access to high quality provision in a safe, nurturing environment enabling them to access learning and make progress, alongside the opportunity to remain part of a mainstream school.

School capacity

Chandlers Field Primary School has a current capacity of 420 for pupils aged 4 to 11 across seven year groups from reception to year 6. The school also has a nursery for 3 to 4 year olds offering up to 78 places.

Pupils attending the SEN Unit would be in addition to the mainstream Planned Admission Number (PAN) of 60.

There would be 25 planned places in the SEN unit increasing the total capacity of 420 pupils to 445.

(b) details of the current number of pupils admitted to the school in each relevant age group, and where this number is to change, the proposed number of pupils to be admitted in each relevant age group in the first school year in which the proposals will have been implemented;

The current Published Admission Number (PAN) for Chandlers Field Primary School is 60 in Year R. Under this proposal, the PAN would remain the same and the 25 places at the SEN unit would be in addition to the mainstream capacity.

It is proposed that the SEN unit would have planned places for: 3 per year group across key stage 1 (reception year, year 1 and year 2) totalling 9; and 4 per year group across key stage 2 (year 3, year 4, year 5 and year 6) totalling 16, making a total of 25 places.

In September 2021 there are 3 planned places in reception year and 4 planned places in year 3. There is capacity for a further intake in January 2022 with: 3 places across year 1 and year 2; and 4 places across year 5 and year 6.

Objectives

10. The objectives of the proposals.

The proposal to provide a SEN Unit is in response to the increased demand for specialist placements for pupils with a primary need of ASC. The SEN Unit at Chandlers Field Primary School will help to meet the longer-term projected demand for this type of need.

The demand for maintained specialist school places in Surrey has grown significantly over the past 4 years from 2,859 planned places in 2017-18 to 3,477 planned places in 2020-21 and increasing again to 3,513 in 2021-22. EHCP growth for ASC in the North East of Surrey has followed a similar pattern with an increase in 2019/20. Between 68% - 78% for pupils in R Year to Year 6.

Developing and maintaining high quality specialist provision in Surrey is vital to ensure appropriate placements for the county's most vulnerable children and young people who have complex SEND and require specialist educational provision.

SCC's Cabinet has approved a total SEND capital investment of £79.6m which will create 1,600 additional specialist school places in Surrey towards the total projected demand. This proposal is just one of the projects named in the strategy to meet the increased demand for specialist places across the county.

All appropriate parties have been made aware of this proposal, inclusive of the Governing Body of the school. A virtual public meeting was held on 3 March 2021

The following people have been made aware of the proposals: parents/carers of children attending the school; employees and Governors of the school; relevant unions; local residents; other users of the school building; other local schools; local borough and county councillors; and the School Admissions Forum.

The informal consultation was open from 22 February to 19 April 2021. There were 102 responses and 100% of respondents agreed with the proposal. The main themes from comments were local support for the proposal, positive comments (including positive impacts for children and young people and praise for the current SEN support at the school) and the need for more specialist provision in Surrey.

Surrey County Council has complied with all applicable statutory requirements to consult in connection with this proposal. At the conclusion of the Notice period, if permission is granted by the Surrey Cabinet Member for All Age Learning, Surrey County Council will implement the proposal.

The proposal will create 25 full time specialist primary school places for pupils (National Curriculum Yr R - Yr 6) with an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP) and who have an Autistic Spectrum Conditions (ASC). The SEN Unit designation is known locally in Surrey as High Communication and Interaction Needs.

The SEN unit will offer opportunities for learners with ASC who would benefit from spending approximately 40-60% of their school day each week in mainstream classes with support. Infant aged pupils will spend up to 50% of their time in the Unit to comply with The School Admissions (Infant Class Sizes) (England) Regulations 2012.

(b) any additional specialist features will be provided;

Staff in the unit will all have experience of working with children who have high COIN needs. They would be empathic to the learning and emotional needs of the children whilst still having high expectations both of behaviour and achievable progress. Some staff will have Elklan training prior to the unit opening. Further training would be given to meet the needs of the children for whom a place is allocated where appropriate.

Learning will use a multi-sensory approach and where possible, will be centred around, or be led by the interests of the children whilst still providing the curriculum coverage required. Learning may be in the form of short bursts of learning with brain breaks or movement breaks when needed to develop the sustained engagement of the children in their learning. In the afternoons there will be opportunities, when the child is ready, to join the mainstream school as part of our promise to be inclusive.

All children will have an EHCP identifying outcomes specific to their needs. These outcomes will be planned for and timetabled to enable the best possible outcomes and progress for each child. Assessment toward these outcomes will be continually assessed and any changes needed will be introduced. Parents and carers will be able to submit photos or examples of their child's success outside of the school day to strengthen the links between home and school.

The school will make the best use of external professional bodies, including health providers, social care, LA support services and voluntary sector organisations, in meeting pupils' SEN and supporting their families.

The school are proud to be able to enhance Surrey's local offer by providing specialist provision at a mainstream school in the NE area of Surrey.

Since 2015, the number of children with an EHCP who live in Surrey and require a specialist school place has increased by 73%. This is in comparison to a growth of just 5% in the five years from 2010 and can potentially be attributed, in part, to the increase in the birth rate, the changes brought about by the Children and Families Act and the SEND Regulations in 2014, the 0-25 SEND Code of Practice in 2015, and the improvements to earlier identification and diagnosis of need.

The demand for maintained specialist school places in Surrey for children and young people with SEND has grown significantly over the past 4 years from 2,859 planned places in 2017-2018 to 3,513 in 2021-2022. As the county's specialist estate has not historically expanded at the same rate as the demand, this is turn has increased reliance on the independent sector to ensure all pupils are able to access suitable full-time education.

The Department for Education's 2019-2020 High Needs Benchmarking Tool identifies Surrey as an outlier with 4.4 per 1000 of the 2-18 population of children and young people with SEND placed in the independent sector; almost twice as many as compared to an average of benchmarking counties including Hampshire, Essex, Kent, East Sussex and Hertfordshire who have 2.25 per 1000. This results in approximately £71.5m cost on the current cohort of 1,350 pupils educated in non-maintained independent provision per year.

Developing and maintaining high quality specialist provision in Surrey is vital to ensure appropriate placements for the county's most vulnerable children and young people who have complex SEND and require specialist educational provision. This is to ensure that all statutory school age children with an EHCP that require a full-time specialist setting in either a mainstream SEN Unit or Special School have a named placement, ready for the beginning of the next academic year.

Surrey currently has approximately 3,700 EHCPs for children and young people with ASC identified as their primary need. Approximately 45% of these pupils attend a specialist provision.

Across Surrey County Council EHCP growth for ASC increased in 2018/19 and 2019/20. The first six months of the academic year 2020/21 are broadly in line with the first six months of 2019/20.

EHCP growth for ASC in the North East of Surrey has followed a similar pattern with an increase in 2019/20. Between 68% - 78% were for pupils in Yr R – Yr 6 in all three years shown in the table below.
